Teachers using CDs created from commercial recordings, are advised that they should themselves seek permission to re–record from the record companies concerned, as the Festival cannot take responsibility for this.

Child Protection Policy

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech work for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children
 of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm.

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- · adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- · recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create Safer Festivals for everyone:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival. The FSO for EGMAF is Paul Johnson, telephone 01342 311359.
- 3. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection leaflets, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new Festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending/performing at a Federation Festival.
- 5. All Festival personnel wear an identity badge. All teachers/ parents/ guardians/ carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival identity badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition each Festival will ensure the availability of a quiet area/room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. For the duration of the Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/ carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/ pupils/ vulnerable adults. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/ pupils/vulnerable adults are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, performance and rehearsal areas that may be provided.
- 7. Only performance areas are supervised by festival volunteers. The theatre auditorium is supervised by Chequer Mead volunteers. This festival has a strict policy on access to changing rooms: parents and teachers only may enter.
- 8. No unauthorised photography or video recording is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/ guardians/ carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child/pupil/vulnerable adult is not included in official authorised photos.
- 9. Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case we ask the responsible teachers/ parents/ guardians/ carers to contact the section secretary of the Festival prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks wherever possible to meet these needs, but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 10. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and on our website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents/ guardians /carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

In *The Bartered Bride* she sang the role of Esmeralda which included training to be a trapeze artist! For Opera North she sang Musetta in *La Bohème*. She has also worked for WNO, Garsington Opera, Kentish Opera, The Carl Rosa Opera Company, Swansea City Opera, Garden Opera and Opera Brava. Roles include Violetta in *La Traviata*, Fiordiligi in *Così fan tutte*, Micaëla in *Carmen*, Pamina and First Lady in *The Magic Flute*, Donna Elvira in *Don Giovanni*, Cio-Cio-san in *Madama Butterfly*, Mimì in *La bohème* and Rosalinde and Adele in *Die Fledermaus*. As a well known performer of Gilbert and Sullivan she has appeared as soprano soloist with the The Savoy Company of Philadelphia. Adjudicator: Anne Harris-Norman LGSM, FESB, ADB(Ed), Member of the British & International Federation of Festivals

Anne Harris-Norman can trace her love of speech and drama to her mother's decision to send her to "elocution lessons" which opened the magic window to an abiding love of verse speaking, literature, theatre, and indeed to her choice of career. While writing a thesis at teacher training college in 1965, Anne was introduced to the value of educational drama and became a drama teacher. With her husband David Harris, she took part in many workshops and together they formed a touring Shakespeare group. In 1975 Anne opened her own Speech and Drama School and 1984 she became Head of Drama at The Grange School. Hartford, where during the next ten years she extended private speech and drama lessons to curriculum drama throughout the school, and eventually to GCSE Drama and A Level Theatre Studies. During the 1980s Anne became an adjudicator for the British and International Federation of Festivals and an examiner for the English Speaking Board, Guildhall School of Music & Drama and Vanguard Examinations, Anne has now retired from examining but continues to enjoy adjudicating and giving verse speaking recitals. A Federation Adjudicator since 1982, Anne understands the commitment and palpitations of performers, teachers and parents. She admires the dedication of festival organisers who continue to provide our young people with important performance experiences, sustaining the ethos of The British and International Federation of Festivals.
